Admission Procedures

The student body of Unity Faith & Truth Bible College is limited to persons who show evidence that they are born again, yielded to the will of God, endowed with necessary spiritual gifts, and in agreement with the Doctrinal Statement of the College.

A nonrefundable application fee must accompany the application. Additionally, the credentials listed below must be submitted.

College and Seminary: Proof of completion of High School or GED for regular admission in the College Program. Additionally, students must provide official transcripts from all colleges attended.

Transfer Students: Should have transcripts of their college-level work sent directly to the Administrator of Unity Faith & Truth Bible College.

Nondiscriminatory Policy: The Unity Faith & Truth Bible College does not discriminate based on sex, race, color, or nationality and ethnic origin in the administration of its educational policies, admissions policies, and other school-administered programs.

Readmit Student: A student who has previously attended the UFTBC but who has not been enrolled for one semester or more. Former students wishing to be readmitted to UFTBC should be in good standing with the seminary in the academic, student development, and business areas. Returning students must complete a returning application.

Transcripts: Official copies of transcripts of previous academic or Biblical college work should be provided with the Application for Admission and Enrollment. Photocopies of transcripts in your possession are acceptable for evaluation purposes.

Ultimately, an official transcript must be forwarded to the UFTBC for each college listed on the Application for Admission and Enrollment. If you do not have copies of your transcripts in your possession, request that each college send one copy to you and one copy to the UFTBC.

Academic Administration

Class Attendance

Students are expected to check in virtually twice a week. Missing over two classes per term can result in an incomplete for the course. Adjustments to grades due to absences and tardiness will be made at the instructor's discretion, in accordance with school policy.

Credit students are expected to attend each class. In the event of necessary absences, make-up assignments must be arranged with the professor. Absences of more than two classes per term will result in automatic failure of the course (at the professor's discretion). Two unexcused tardies count as one absence.

Missed Exams

Students absent without excuse on the dates of mid-term exams or finals will receive a zero on the test. Absences will be excused at the discretion of the professor. Makeup exams must be completed within one week and will be scheduled at the professor's discretion. They must be obtained in advance. The Academic Dean must approve any exception.

When a course is repeated, the grade thus earned replaces the previously earned lower grade.

If a student withdraws from a course before taking the first examination or the midpoint of the course, whichever is earlier, the grade of WP will be given. If the student withdraws after the first examination, the grade of WP or WF will be determined by their scholastic achievement to that point. If a student withdraws after the midpoint of the course, a grade of F will be automatically awarded.

A credit student who fails to complete all course requirements will receive an "incomplete" and is allowed 30 days from the last day of class to complete course requirements. If requirements are incomplete beyond this extension, the "I" will be changed to "F".

Academic Probation

A student who falls below a 2.0 GPA in two successive quarters will be on academic probation for the following quarter. Failure to remove oneself from probation after the quarter will result in dismissal from the credit program. Should a dismissed student wish to apply for readmission, they may submit an application to the Academic Dean for an evaluation of the cause for dismissal. If the student is deemed capable of achieving a grade of 2.0 or above, the student may be readmitted on academic probation.

Grade Reports

Grade reports are issued to each student at the end of each term, provided that financial obligations have been met. It is expected that the work done will represent faithfulness and conscientious application on the part of every student. Although grades are not regarded as an end in themselves, they typically represent not only the student's knowledge of the subject but also their diligence in studying it.

Transcripts

A transcript, which contains the cumulative record of courses taken, grades, and credits earned, is maintained for each student. Transcripts may be released only to another educational institution via mail. Official transcripts require a \$5 fee. Unofficial transcripts will be mailed for \$3 each.

Graduation Requirements

Candidates for graduation in the degree program must satisfactorily fulfill all required curricula, maintain a minimum grade point average of 2.0, and meet all financial obligations. Additionally, every student is expected to abide by the UFTBC Honor and Integrity Standards outlined in this catalog.

Required Courses

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Associate Course Description

ABS-101-English Requirement: A study of the English language, including grammar, mechanics, punctuation, and usage with emphasis on composition, completed sentences, and paragraphs using correct spelling.

ABS-102-Introduction to the Bible: 6

ABS-103-Old Testament Study Part 1: A practical study of Old Testament law and history. This course covers the books Genesis through Esther. Emphasis will be placed on relating each book to the Bible as a whole and on practical application for today.

ABS-104-Discipleship: Study of a Christian's position in Christ. Students are also taught how to be a positive influence through an effective life witness that brings glory to God.

ABS-105 Old Testament Study Part 2: A practical study of the books Job through Malachi of the Old Testament. Special emphasis will be placed on the books Psalms and Proverbs, as well as Messianic prophecies and prophecy relating to today.

ABS-106-New Testament Study: A comprehensive study of the New Testament books. Students will study the principal theme and chronological sequence of each book. ABS-108 Rightly Dividing Word of Truth/What Christians Believe: Outline studies of the more important divisions of scripture, and scriptural studies of fundamental Biblical beliefs.

ABS-107-The Life of Christ: All four Gospels are consulted to survey the earthly life and ministry of Jesus Christ. Special emphasis is given to the chronology of events, the major discourses, the essential critical issues, and present-day applications.

ABS-108-The Book of Acts: This course will entail a detailed study of the special features of the Book of Acts, including the prominence of the Lord Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit, as well as the power and growth of the Church.

ABS-109-Fruit of the Spirit: This course explores the biblical principles of the Fruit of the Spirit found in Galatians 5:22–23, emphasizing the development of Christlike character through the work of the Holy Spirit. Students will examine each of the nine characteristics of the Fruit of the Spirit and learn how to apply them in their personal lives, relationships, leadership, and ministry. The course encourages spiritual growth, maturity, and a lifestyle that reflects the character of Jesus Christ.

ABS-110-Faith and Application: This course examines the biblical principles of faith and their practical application in everyday Christian living. Students will learn how to develop unwavering faith, apply God's Word to real-life situations, and walk in obedience, trust, and spiritual maturity. Emphasis is placed on living out one's faith through prayer, service, discipleship, and a Christ-centered lifestyle. .

ABS -111-Rightly Dividing Word of Truth/What Christians Believe: In-person and on-tline studies of the more important divisions of scripture, and scriptural studies of basic Biblical beliefs.

ABS - 112-What is Worship: This foundational class explores the heart, purpose, and power of worship from a biblical perspective. Together, we will uncover how worship goes beyond music and Sunday services, revealing it as a lifestyle of reverence, obedience, and intimacy with God.

ABS - 113 - Saturday School of Kingdom Living: The Saturday School of Kingdom Living is designed to equip believers with practical biblical principles for living a Christ-centered life. Through sound biblical teaching, spiritual formation, and practical application, students will grow in their faith, develop Christlike character, and learn to live according to the values of God's Kingdom. These courses emphasize discipleship, spiritual maturity, and applying God's Word in everyday life, ministry, and leadership.

Bachelor Course Description

BTS-201 Theology and Christology: The study of God, His existence, attributes, His work in predestination, preservation, and providence. It also includes the study of Christ in His preexistence, deity, incarnation, humanity, death, and atonement.

BTS-202 Epistles Part 1& 2: An examination of the argument and structural development of the Pauline Romans, 1 & 2 Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, 1 & 2 Thessalonians, 1 & 2 Timothy, Titus, and Philemon to discover God's great plan for our lives today. Special projects are assigned in some epistles to provide students with practice in inductive Bible Study. **Pt. 2** - An examination of the argument and structural development of James, 1 and 2 Peter, 1, 2, and 3 John, and Jude to discover God's great plan for our lives today. Special projects are assigned in some epistles to give the student practice in inductive Bible Study.

BTS-203 Apologetics: This course is designed to generate confidence concerning the Christian faith through a rational defense and response to anti-Christian objections. Attention is given to a variety of Christian evidence that supports the claims of Christianity.

BTS-204 The Temple:

BTS-205 Great Doctrines of the Bible: Defines and discusses concisely the fundamental Bible doctrines in everyday language. Through proper study and interpretation, students are taught how to impart Bible doctrine to others in non-technical language.

BTS-206 Special Additional Entries: An overview of eighty (80) keys, doctrines, ordinances, and hard sayings of the Bible.

BTS-207 The Devil and Demonic Powers: A scriptural examination of the devil and demonic powers, the victory of believers over time with Christ, and the believer's authority over them. Emphasis will be placed on the ministry of deliverance.

BTS-208 Pneumatology/The Holy Spirit: This course analyzes the biblical concepts and principles of the Person and work of the Holy Spirit. It examines the gifts of the Holy Spirit and indicates how contemporary Christians may personally relate to them.

BTS-209 Ministering in the Anointing: This course will emphasize knowing the Anointed One, Jesus, in the spirit of anointing. Students will be encouraged to recognize the need to be sensitive to the anointing for worship and service.

BTS-210 Christian Life & Ethics: This course analyzes the formation of Christian ethical understandings about culture and society and how to deal with current social problems. Special attention will be given to areas such as racism, human sexuality, marriage and family, business, and Church and state.

BTS-211 Authority of the Believer: This course provides a scriptural analysis of the authority of the believer over the flesh, the world, and the devil

BTS - 212 Saturday School of Kingdom Living: The Saturday School of Kingdom Living is designed to equip believers with practical biblical principles for living a Christ-centered life. Through sound biblical teaching, spiritual formation, and practical application, students will grow in their faith, develop Christlike character, and learn to live according to the values of God's Kingdom. These courses emphasize discipleship, spiritual maturity, and applying God's Word in everyday life, ministry, and leadership.

Required Courses

Master Course Description

MDS-401- Introduction to Christian Counseling: The Course emphasizes the importance of having both ordained and non-ordained persons trained in basic counseling. In this course, students will recognize that deeply embedded behavioral problems require special attention. Focus will be placed upon right relations with God and fellow man, overcoming philosophies of defeat, and embracing a spirit of growth in Christ.

MDS-402- Current Issues in the Church: This course examines today's most pressing issues facing the Church from a biblical perspective. Students will explore topics such as sound doctrine, cultural influences, leadership, discipleship, church unity, and contemporary ministry challenges. Emphasis is placed on applying Scripture to equip believers for effective, Christ-centered leadership and ministry in an ever-changing world.

MDS-403- Hermeneutics: An examination of the fundamental principles of interpretation as a basis for correct understanding, proper handling, and exegesis of Scripture.

MDS-404- Christian Counseling: This course is designed to acquaint the students with the four basic paradigms of Christian counseling: Insight-oriented, Behavioral, Cognitive, and Faith-healing. The philosophical assumptions and uses of specific techniques with each paradigm will be discussed.

MDS-406- Homiletics: An examination of the structure and preparation of Biblical messages. Primary emphasis on formulating a homiletical idea from a Biblical text, developing and supporting it with appropriate application to a given audience. Students will prepare and deliver messages in class.

MDS-407- Chaplaincies: This course first focuses on the chaplain's authority and conscience in relationship to the Word of God. The course then concentrates on the chaplains' ministry in the following areas: healthcare, death and dying, Christian rehabilitation, prisoners and their families, morale, and family perspectives.

MDS-408- Pastoral Ministry: This course provides a biblical and practical foundation for pastoral ministry. Students will explore the biblical role of the pastor, shepherding, preaching, teaching, leadership, counseling, discipleship, and pastoral care. Emphasis is placed on developing Christ-centered servant leaders who are equipped to faithfully lead, nurture, and minister to the needs of God's people.

MDS-409- Thesis Writing and Formatting: To provide the student with information and steps in completing an outstanding thesis.

MDS-410- Saturday School of Kingdom Living: The Saturday School of Kingdom Living is designed to equip believers with practical biblical principles for living a Christ-centered life. Through sound biblical teaching, spiritual formation, and practical application, students will grow in their faith, develop Christlike character, and learn to live according to the values of God's Kingdom. These courses emphasize discipleship, spiritual maturity, and applying God's Word in everyday life, ministry, and leadership.

MDS-411- Effective Evangelism/Soul Winning: Evangelism is the mandate for church growth today. This course explores the biblical foundations of evangelism, conversion, and regeneration, as well as strategies for leading individuals to a decision for Christ, age-specific techniques, collaborative efforts, visitation, discipling new believers, and the importance of prayer in the overall evangelism program.

MDS-412- Developing Thesis Topic and Statement: Independent work and research.

MDS-413- Research and Composition of Thesis: Independent work, research, and advisement

MDS-414- Thesis Submission of Rough Draft: Independent work and advisement. Submission of Rough Draft.

MDS-415- Defending Thesis: Meet with advisor and the defending committee

MDS-416- Thesis Submission of Final Draft: Submission of Final Work

Doctoral Course Description

DMS-601- Research Methodology: This research methodology course teaches you how to design, conduct, and document an effective scientific research project. We explain how to formulate a research problem, design research methods, select samples, and write a research proposal. The course then demonstrates how to collect, process, analyze, and present data before taking you through the steps required to write a clear and compelling research report.

DMS-602 -Purposeful Writing: To provide the student with information and steps in completing a great dissertation

DMS-603- Competency for Inquiry: Independent work, research, and advisement.

DMS-604- Church Administration -This course introduces the biblical principles and practical skills of effective church administration. Students will examine leadership, organizational structure, strategic planning, financial stewardship, communication, volunteer management, and church operations. Emphasis is placed on equipping leaders to manage ministry with excellence, integrity, and biblical wisdom.

DMS - 605 -Development of Dissertation Topic, Outline/Table of Contents: Independent work, research, and advisement.

DMS-606 -Examination: Review for the examination process.

DMS-607 -Research and Composition: Independent work, research, and advisement.

DMS-608 -Understanding Your Purpose: This course teaches your original purpose for existence and the source of meaning behind your life.

DMS-609 -Saturday School of Kingdom Living: The Saturday School of Kingdom Living is designed to equip believers with practical biblical principles for living a Christ-centered life. Through sound biblical teaching, spiritual formation, and practical application, students will grow in their faith, develop Christlike character, and learn to live according to the values of God's Kingdom. These courses emphasize discipleship, spiritual maturity, and applying God's Word in everyday life, ministry, and leadership.

DMS-610 - Submission of Dissertation Rough Draft: Independent work and advisement.

DMS-611-Defending Dissertation: Meet with advisor and the defending committee.

DMS-612- Submission of Dissertation Final Draft: Submission of final work.

Doctor of Ministry Doctor of Theology

A student should possess a Master's Degree with a Biblical background before being considered for the Doctoral Degree Program; however, you may have a rich history in Pastoring and Ministry that will be reviewed and considered by the President, respectively

In general, the admission process follows standard UFTBC procedures. It is based on the applicant's academic record, letters of recommendation, the master's degree record, and a summary of why they want to enter the Doctoral Degree Program

The Doctoral student must write a 25,000-word (50-page) Dissertation in his or her chosen field of study and must defend before a board.

To complete the Doctoral Degree Program, it will take one year of study and submission of the assigned dissertation work. Upon completion of all assigned work, the student will be evaluated for candidacy for the Doctoral Degree.
